

Joining BEAS

Who is BEAS for?

- * Any child aged 3 years to 4 years who meets the following criteria:
- * He or she has a diagnosis of autism or has been identified with complex social communication needs and is on the Autism Assessment Service Waiting List
- * The child's parents or carers feel that they are able to participate fully in the support programme
- * An Educational Psychologist and a core member of the BEAS team agree that this is an appropriate intervention
- * No other specialist interventions are in place. This applies to both council services as well as to those funded by parents themselves.

Contacting the BEAS Service

- * The first step is a referral to the Early Years Specialist Support Services with parental agreement. This can be done by a Health Visitor, Community Paediatrician, GP or Speech and Language Therapist.
- * Requests to the Bexley Early Autism Service are made through discussions with Bexley Educational Psychologists and the Early Years Specialist Support Services.
- * (Leaflets are available which describe the Early Years Specialist Support (EYSS) Services and Educational Psychology services in Bexley)

Bexley Early Autism Service

Bexley Early Autism Service (BEAS) provides support for very young children who have complex social communication difficulties and are recognised to be on the autism spectrum (See over). Support is tailored to individual children and families and is delivered by members of a trained and experienced team in the home and / or pre-school or nursery setting.

In Bexley we believe that:

- * early intervention is crucial for the social, emotional and educational development of young children with complex social communication difficulties
- * the most influential people in the child's life are his or her parents / carers and therefore providing information and support directly to parents / carers underpins the service
- * intervention should be practical: by this we mean it should help families develop skills to support their child with everyday skills and adaption to family and social life
- * direct work with individual children and families in their home and with staff in the pre-school setting is highly effective in supporting the child's whole development
- * direct support for Early Years Practitioners and settings (nursery and reception) in developing their skills in working with children with autism aids the child's transition to school at the appropriate time

How the BEAS Partnerships works

The commitment of parents/carers is to:

- * provide a suitable area where the sessions can take place at home
- * participate in sessions and work with the support team towards the best outcomes for the child
- * continue the programme by working with their child towards agreed goals
- * apply successful strategies in their everyday lives with their child
- * attend relevant workshops and / or Early Bird Parent Course as available
- * attend review meetings relevant to their child's programme

The commitment of the BEAS team is to:

- * provide a programme of support for the family, their child and the pre-school/nursery
- * provide an agreed number of sessions each week with a specialist BEAS team member
- * adapt the support for parents and carers to meet the needs of each family and their child
- * adapt the programme to meet the child's needs
- * incorporate advice from specialist professionals such as, speech and language therapy and occupational therapy assessments
- * convene regular casework meetings to monitor the programme, review the child's progress and to set new targets
- * provide specialised teaching materials and all relevant information and reports
- * work with families in the best interests of the child

What we aim to do

Children

- * provide an individualised programme that focuses on developing communication, attention, early learning, self help and play skills
- * provide trained specialists to work both directly with you and your child at home and collaboratively with pre-school staff in the pre-school / nursery
- * model effective strategies and approaches for you to follow on in your day to day life with your child

Parents

- * provide information to further your understanding of autism spectrum (including a parent workshop currently on hold due to Covid)
- * enable you to develop effective strategies to address your child's daily needs
- * support your role in promoting communication, attention, early learning and play

Nurseries / pre-schools

- * provide training and support for staff to enable them to further their knowledge and skill in working with children on the autism spectrum
- * work regularly and collaboratively with preschool / nursery staff to achieve consistency across settings
- * support communication between home and educational settings
- * support the child's transition to Reception at the appropriate time
